## NEW NORFOLK

Welcome to New Norfolk, capital of the Derwent Valley. In true Valley fashion, New Norfolk isn't that new at all. In fact, New Norfolk is old... home-to-the-Leenowwenne-people-of-the-Big-River-Nation-and-then-established-by-European-settlers-in-1807 kind of old. The town serves as the agricultural, tourism and commercial hub for the region, and is home to heritage buildings, markets, events, retail, and dining.

#### **New Norfolk Market**

The New Norfolk Market is a weekly legend in these parts. Speak its name, the state over, and you will meet many who travel from far and wide to savour the finest local fresh produce, arts and crafts, collectibles, vintage, food vendors and live music.

#### **Antiques Trail**

New Norfolk is widely regarded as the 'Antiques Capital of Tasmania'. With numerous vintage, collectibles and antiques stores in town, including regular markets and fairs, old will always be the new new on the New Norfolk Antiques Trail.

#### **Willow Court**

Built in 1827, and serving as the longest running asylum in the Southern Hemisphere, the historical Willow Court Asylum and Barracks has had a dark and controversial past. It is now home to The Valley's only hatted restaurant, a rum distillery, arts precinct, as well as regular ghost and history tours.

#### Tynwald Park & The Esplanade

Set against the picturesque Derwent River, these connected parklands form the activities centre of The Valley. The precinct is home to sporting ovals, outdoor fitness equipment, playgrounds, a swimming pool, BBQ amenities and family areas, as well as water-based activities such as paddle boarding, hydro-biking, swimming, fishing, and the occasional dragon boat race.

## MOUNT FIELD NATIONAL PARK



The oldest national park in Tasmania, and part of the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area, Mount Field is about as Derwent Valley as it gets. Home to the world's tallest flowering plant, the Eucalyptus regnans, the fagus, ski fields, alien landscapes, charming waterfalls, and, as locals will have you believe, the odd thylacine or two.

#### OUTDOORS 5

#### **Russell Falls**

The most picturesque waterfall in Tasmania (and, subsequently, the most photographed), the three-tiered Russell Falls has become something of a local legend. In fact, there are some who say its waters are magical - the fountain of youth. All we know is that it's one photogenic waterfall.



#### Tarn Shelf Walk

One of the great walks in Tasmania, Tarn Shelf Walk leads trampers across the Tarn Shelf and past a series of glacial lakes, with views out over the Rodway Range. Along the route, take a break at the historical Twilight Tarn Hut. In Autumn months, the hills are ablaze with the 'turning of the fagus'.

#### OUTDOORS 7

#### **Tall Trees Walk**

Before you set foot on the Tall Trees Walk, we strongly suggest you speak to a chiropractor first — as your neck's in for some punishment. The trees here — it may not surprise you — they're tall. Maybe too tall... And if that's not neck-hinging enough, it's said thylacine still roam these parts... So, best keep your wits about you.

## STRATHGORDON & SURROUNDS



Some say Strathgordon has the clearest skies in Tasmania. Although we can't say for sure... But, on a cloudless night, as the dark skies are aflame with the Aurora Australis, it's hard to argue otherwise. As well as being a proposed Dark Sky Sanctuary, it is a sanctuary for naturelovers, trout-whisperers, thrillseekers and platypus-spotters.

#### OUTDOORS 8

#### Lake Pedder

Lake Pedder is Australia's largest freshwater lake and catchment system, and, along with Lake Gordon, comprise the largest inland freshwater system in Australia, covering more than 500km<sup>2</sup> and holding 37 times the volume of Sydney Harbour. A key part of Tasmania's hydroelectric scheme, its fabled waters are coveted by trout fishermen, kayakers, swimmers, picnickers and the odd naturist or two.



#### **Gordon River Dam**

The Gordon River Dam has always been a talking point. Controversial in its construction, the 140 metre high dam wall not only provides 13% of Tasmania's energy needs, but is also the setting for the tallest commercial abseiling experience in the world. Lose your lunch as you plunge off the wall, through the mist, towards the freezing waters below, before winching back towards the heavens. It's great.

## PLENTY, BUSHY PARK, WESTERWAY, MAYDENA

The largest hops garden in the Southern Hemisphere; the birthplace of Australian brewing; the oldest trout hatchery in the Southern Hemisphere; the deepest cave system in the Southern Hemisphere; the highest vertical mountain bike drop in Australia... the most superlatives ever used in a guide book (in the Southern Hemisphere)? Yep, only in the Derwent Valley.

#### The Salmon Ponds

Salmon Ponds, naturally, is home to the oldest trout hatchery in the Southern Hemisphere — it's a long story (ask around or visit the on-site museum). The hatchery introduces over 1 million trout into the local waters each year and is home to a museum, some splendid gardens, a crêperie and a resident platypus.

#### Bushy Parks Hops Museum & Market

Bushy Park is often regarded as the home of Australian brewing. Founded by the excellently-named Ebenezer Shoobridge, Bushy Park is home to the oldest continuously operating hop garden in the world, as well as the Bushy Park Hops Museum and Community Market.

#### OUTDOORS

#### Maydena Bike Park

A gravity-focussed mountain bike park featuring just a casual 73+ gravity trails (for all levels), including a top to bottom family-friendly ride and the highest vertical drop trail in the Southern Hemisphere — 820m+ of white-knuckled mayhem through spectacular old-growth forest.

#### Styx Big Tree Reserve

Deep within the ominous sounding Styx Forest, is the also ominous sounding Styx Big Tree Reserve. But, all is well, as the only thing shadowy in these forests are those cast by the gigantic Eucalyptus regnans, the second tallest trees in the world.

OUTDOORS 14

#### Junee Cave & Walking Track

The Junee Cave system is the deepest cave tract in the Southern Hemisphere (perhaps even the world — as we're yet to find the end of it). With over 30km of cave networks and some 295 caves, it can be accessed via a gentle 1km walk through picturesque rainforest.

If it's going to grow anywhere, chances are the Derwent Valley is the place for it. Whether it's the microclimate, the remoteness, the pure waters, or just our care and attention, it's in our nature to take it to the extreme. And, as home to one of the most awarded restaurants in Tasmania, a swarm of microbreweries, distilleries, cooking schools, bars and markets, you're bound to catch your fill.

# FOOD & CRAFT

#### PRODUCE

There's something in the soil here that makes our produce... unnatural. There are the perfect **Reid Farm** cherries that sell for over \$100/kg; the **Westerway Raspberry Farm** berries prized by restaurants and Country Women's Association jam-makers everywhere; truffles so earthy you can taste the Proterozoic; and stone fruits so sweet that spitting out the pits may cost you your fortune.

#### CRAFTS

When you're surrounded by woodlands, quarries, paper mills, kilns, and isolated from the world (we are 40 minutes away from Hobart after all), you can't help but be a little crafty. Woodworking at the **Derwent Valley School of Creative Woodwork**; take a pottery workshop at the **Leap & Wander Studio**; learn letterpress printing at **Flywheel** or pick up a craft kit from **The ArtHouse New Norfolk** — all makes for a very hands-on Derwent Valley experience.

#### **CAFES & RESTAURANTS**

We're the first to admit it, Derwent Valley's food scene has come a long way from the quaint old teahouses and B&Bs of yore. We still have those, plenty of them, but now the word's finally out - we also have **The Agrarian Kitchen Eatery**, one of Tassie's most awarded restaurants, and **Glen Derwent Tea Rooms** serving up delectable devonshire and high teas to squeals of delight. We also have great coffee shops, bakeries, pubs, and the only platypus-friendly crêperie in the world (well, that we know of).

#### COOKING SCHOOLS

It's been said that **The Agrarian Kitchen Cooking School** is "by far the best cooking school in Australia". And, that very well may be true. But whether it's paddock-to-plate or paddock-to-preserving-jar, our sustainable farming practices and culinary traditions make all our schools a deeply flavourful experience.

# WINE & FERMENTS



#### **PUBS & BARS**

When was the last time you cheersed a ghost? Or spotted UFOs from a beer garden? And, no, that's not the beer talking. Besides being the oldest continually licensed pub in Australia (since 1815 to be precise), **The Bush Inn** has long been famous for its less visible locals. And, at **The National Park Hote**I, Tasmania's UFO spotting capital (for a brief period in the 70s), you can grab a tenner and stare at the sky... waiting...

#### BREWERIES

Seven out of 10 Australian beers are brewed using our Bushy Park's hops (apparently). So, naturally, we've mastered this hoppy elixir. **Two Metre Tall** has long been a world trailblazer for wild ferment beers. **Eleventh Order Brewery** has created a Tasmanian Pale Ale using only local ingredients. And **Welcome Swallow Brewery** uses their own hops to brew bombastic special releases.

## DISTILLERIES

This is a region of biggests, deepests, wildests and weirdests, so it doesn't surprise when some of our microest things are making some of the loudest noises. Like the **New Norfolk Rum Distillery**: a contemporary micro-distillery based in the historic Willow Court precinct, whose range of rums and liqueurs are beloved by locals — and awarded by critics.

#### **VINEYARDS & CELLAR DOORS**

It's only expected that our vineyards have their own stories to tell. Legend has it, **Derwent Estate** vines are planted on fossilised dinosaur bones (some kind of giant wombat, or so we're told). **Stefano Lubiana** has been growing biodynamic, natural wines before natural wines were a thing. Add a host of up-andcoming wineries all cultivating vines in the most inhospitable of regions, and you've got some of the most exciting wines in Australia. If wine isn't your vibe, drop past **Plenty Cider** cellar door for a tasting paddle, or try some small batch, limited release ciders.



# ADVENTURE & NATURE

#### TRAILS

In the Derwent Valley, it's hard to know where one walking trail ends and another begins. Whether you're touring glacial peaks on the **Tarn Shelf Walk**, plunging into rainforests on the **Junee Cave Walking Track**, spotting funghi on the way to **the Growling Swallet** where the Junee River plunges into darkness, wandering amongst the giants in **Mount Field National Park**, soaking up the waterfalls on **The Three Falls Circuit**, or just creating a track of your very own, there's a trail connecting everybody and every ability.

#### **MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAILS**

Where there's a hill, there's a way. Throughout The Valley, mountain bike trails weave and dip throughout the landscape like scripture on a big, deep, wild, weird parchment. From the many world-class tracks at **Maydena Bike Park**, to the unofficial tracks that may or may not exist just out of view, there always seems to be a trail ready for exploration.






### <mark>FIS</mark>HING

If you can't catch a trout in the Derwent Valley, then you may as well just give up on fishing altogether. Rainbow trout, brown trout, the waters here are jammed with them. Simply cast a line in the **River Derwent**, Lake Pedder, Lake Gordon or the **Tyenna River**, and do your best to reel them in — or, speak to a local, and discover one of their many favourite secrets spots.
